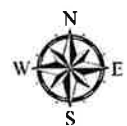
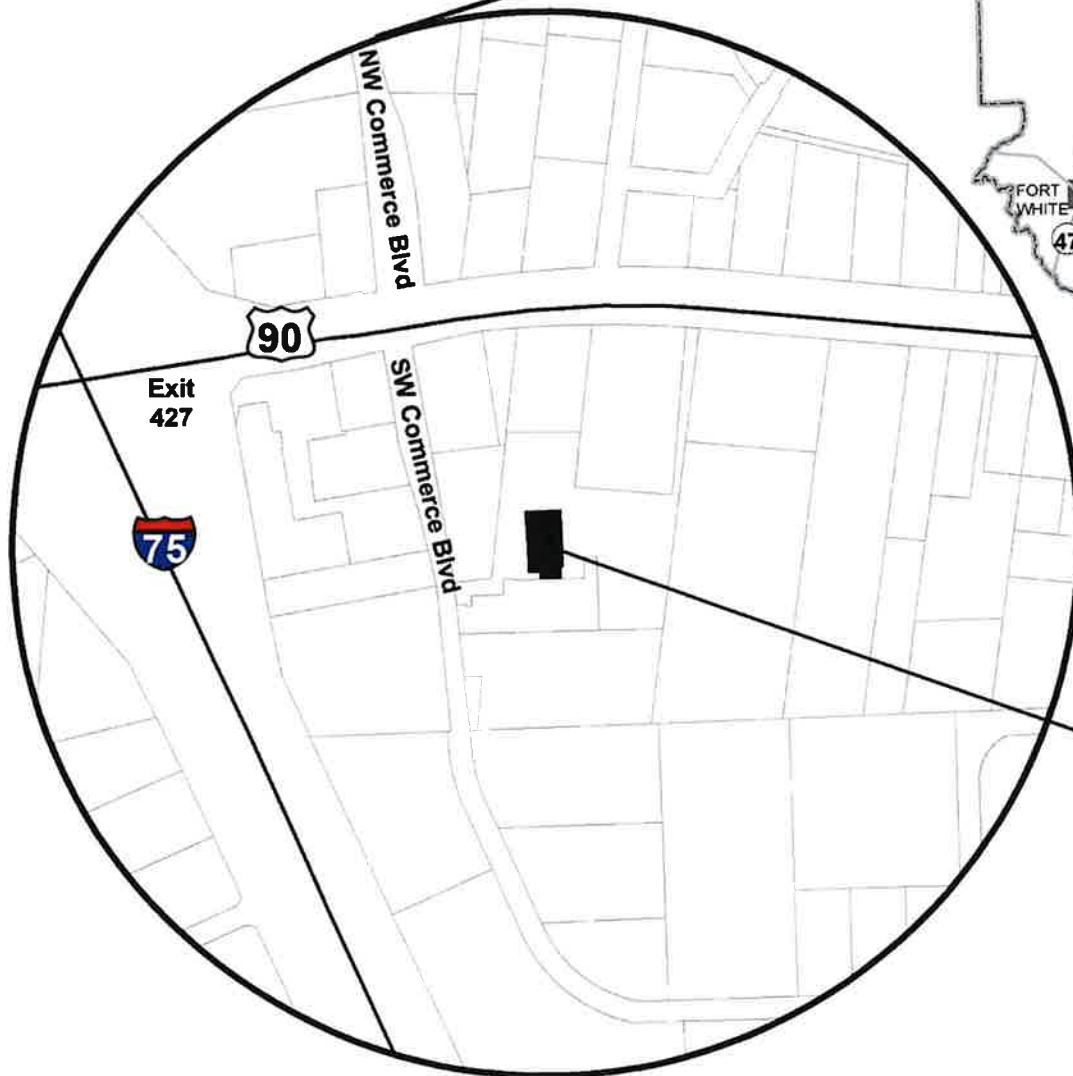

I. INVOCATION

Chair Jhelecia Hawkins noting a quorum being present called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Commissioner Melissa McNeal gave the invocation.

II. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The Council and guests pledged allegiance to the flag of the United States of America.

III. INTRODUCTIONS

Chair Hawkins welcomed Stew Lilker, Columbia County Observer. Also, in attendance at the meeting was Rita Najin, wife of Council Member Ricky Jernigan. Attending the meeting virtually was Diana Davis, Executive Director, Alachua County League of Cities and wife of Council Member Louie Davis.

IV. APPROVAL OF CONSENT AGENDA

Chair Hawkins asked that the consent agenda be approved.

ACTION: Commissioner Wheeler made the motion, with a second by Vice-Mayor Bouie Hutchonson, to approve the consent agenda. The motion carried unanimously.

V. APPROVAL OF REGULAR AGENDA

Chair Hawkins asked that the regular agenda be approved.

ACTION: Commissioner Demps made the motion, with a second by Mayor Hope, to approve the regular agenda. The motion carried unanimously.

VI. GUEST SPEAKER - Patrick Wnek, Executive Director
North East Florida Educational Consortium

Scott Koons, Executive Director, introduced Patrick Wnek, Executive Director, North East Florida Educational Consortium. Dr. Wnek made a presentation concerning the North East Florida Educational Consortium and its initiatives in the north central Florida region. Chair Hawkins thanked him for his presentation.

VII. CHAIR REPORT

A. Committee Appointments

ACTION: Vice-Mayor Bouie Hutchinson made the motion, with a second by Commissioner Wheeler, to ratify the appointment by the Chair of Jimmy Norris, Director, Suwannee County Economic Development, as Chair of the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy Committee; Jennifer Daniels, Director, Columbia County Economic Development, as Vice-Chair of the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy Committee; and Karen VanAernam, Liaison, Dixie County Economic Development, as a member of the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy Committee. The motion carried unanimously.

B. Florida Association of Counties - Presidential Advocate Awards

Chair Hawkins stated, that at the Florida Association of Counties Annual Meeting held in Orlando on June 25, 2026, Florida Association of Counties President Michelle Lincoln awarded Presidential Advocate Awards to Lafayette County Commissioner Anthony Adams; Alachua County Commissioner Mary Alford; Taylor County Commissioner Thomas Demps; Levy County Commissioner Johnny Hiers; and Union County Commissioner Melissa McNeal.

Chair Hawkins congratulated these county commissioners on their accomplishments.

C. Florida Association of Counties - Board of Directors Election

Chair Hawkins stated that at the Florida Association of Counties Annual Meeting held in Orlando on June 25, 2026, Alachua County Commissioner Mary Alford was elected to the Board of Directors for a two-year term ending in 2028. She congratulated Commissioner Alford.

D. Florida Small County Coalition - Officers and Board of Directors Election

Chair Hawkins stated that at the Florida Small County Coalition Annual Meeting held in Orlando on June 24, 2026, the Coalition held its election of officers and members of the Board of Directors. She reported that Lafayette County Commissioner Anthony Adams will be continuing to serve a two-year term ending in 2027 on the Board of Directors of the Coalition. She congratulated Commissioner Adams.

E. Executive Director Service on Board of Directors
National Association of Development Organizations

Chair Hawkins stated that Joe McKinney, Executive Director of the National Association of Development Organizations recently sent her a letter recognizing Executive Director Scott Koons for his continued service on the National Association of Development Organizations as a Past President of the Organization. She stated that the Association was founded in 1967 and provides advocacy, education, networking and research for the network of 540 regional development organizations. Chair Hawkins further stated that the organization also promotes programs and policies that strengthen local governments, communities and economies through regional cooperation, program delivery and comprehensive strategies. She thanked Mr. Koons for his leadership and service.

VIII. COMMITTEE REPORTS

A. Executive Committee -

1 Executive Director Employment Contract Time Extension Amendment

Chair Hawkins reported that the employment contract with Executive Director Scott Koons expires on September 30, 2026. She stated the Executive Committee, in accordance with the extension clause of the contract, recommends a four-year extension to September 30, 2030, with all other terms and conditions of the contract to remain in full force and effect.

ACTION: Mayor Hope made the motion, with a second by Commissioner Wheeler, to approve a four-year employment contract extension to September 30, 2030 with all other terms and conditions of the contract to remain in full force and effect of the employment contract with Executive Director Scott Koons. The motion carried unanimously.

B. Clearinghouse Committee - Committee Level Comprehensive Plan Review Items

Scott Koons, Executive Director, reported that the Clearinghouse Committee did not meet earlier in the evening due to a lack of a quorum. He reviewed the following local government comprehensive plan amendment which was included on the Council agenda for consideration.

#47 - City of Newberry Comprehensive Plan Draft Amendment (FC No. 26-5ESR)

Mr. Koons stated with regards to this item, the staff report found that the local government comprehensive plan, as amended, was not anticipated to result in significant adverse impacts to regional facilities, Natural Resources of Regional Significance or adjacent local governments. He stated that staff recommends forwarding these findings to the respective local government and the Florida Department of Commerce.

ACTION: Commissioner Demps made the motion, with a second by Vice-Mayor Bouie Hutchinson, to approve the staff report concerning Item #47 - City of Newberry Comprehensive Plan Draft Amendment (FC No. 26-5ESR). The motion carried unanimously.

IX. EX-OFFICIO MEMBER REPORTS

Austin Burgess, Senior Biologist, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, discussed chronic wasting disease, a fatal neurological illness affecting deer. He requested that anyone witnessing abnormal behavior by deer should report the issue to the Commission by calling the Commission's Wildlife Hotline at 866.293.9282.

XI. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT

A. Florida Regional Councils Association Monthly Activity Report

Mr. Koons reported that the Florida Regional Councils Association is the statewide organization of the ten regional planning councils. He stated that the Association strengthens Florida's regional planning councils, partners with government and the business community to enhance regional economic prosperity and improves the consistency and quality of regional planning councils programs to ensure they add value to state, regional and local initiatives. Mr. Koons also stated that the Association strives to accomplish these goals by carrying out the activities listed in the June 2026 activity report included in the Council meeting packet. He reviewed the activities listed in the June 2026 report.

B. Florida Chamber Foundation Scorecard™

Mr. Koons reported that the Florida Chamber Foundation has developed the Florida Scorecard™ to provide Florida leaders the metrics needed to secure Florida's future. He stated that the Florida Chamber Foundation's objective to developing a 20-year, statewide strategic plan requires a commitment to measuring our current status and progress toward the stated goals of the Six Pillars 20-year Strategic Plan. Mr. Koons noted that the Scorecard reports metrics for each of the following Six Pillars: Talent and Supply Education, Innovation and Economic Development, Infrastructure and Growth Leadership, Business Climate and Competitiveness, Civic and Governance Systems, and Quality of Life and Quality Places. He reviewed the July 2026 Scorecard™ that was included in the Council meeting packet.

C. Office Building and Warehouse Roof Replacement

Mr. Koons reported that on April 11, 2025, a severe hail storm occurred in northwest Gainesville dropping up to two-inch (golf ball size) hail resulting in damage to the Council's office building metal roof and warehouse metal roof. He noted that the office building metal roof had previously been treated with a polyurethane sealant in 2007. Mr. Koons stated that following the hail storm, the Council's property and casualty insurance carrier, Florida Municipal Insurance Trust, had its inspector inspect both roofs and verified damage necessitating the replacement of the office building metal roof and replacement of approximately 25 percent of the warehouse metal roof.

Mr. Koons reported that the Trust's TurnKey Recovery Program was used for the roof replacement project. He noted that the Trust's recovery program manager, Syngery/NDS, prepared technical specifications and used the Program's Qualified Managed Vendor Program contractor list to solicit bids. Mr. Koons stated that construction repair work was completed on April 14, 2026. He reported that the new acrylic-coated galvalume metal roof has a 25-year material warranty and the construction repair work has a 12-month workmanship warranty. Mr. Koons noted that the total cost of the project was \$333,837 with the Council's share being limited to the property and casualty insurance policy deductible of \$500.

D. 2025-26 Member James H. Montgomery Certificates of Outstanding Attendance

Mr. Koons stated an essential component of the ability of the Council to conduct its business is the regular attendance of members at Council meetings. He stated a Council Member Attendance Recognition Program was established by the Council at the May 22, 2008 Council meeting to recognize the commitment of those Council members actively engaged in the organization by regularly attending Council meetings.

Mr. Koons stated the Council named the Member Attendance Recognition Program the James H. Montgomery Certificate of Outstanding Attendance in honor of Mr. Montgomery at the February 26, 2020 Council meeting. He stated James H. Montgomery served on the Council from 1976 to 2004 as a member representing the Board of County Commissioners of Columbia County, Florida. Mr. Koons stated that from 2010 to 2019, he also served on the Council as a gubernatorial appointee. He stated he provided 38 years of distinguished leadership and service to the Council.

Mr. Koons presented James H. Montgomery Certificates of Outstanding Attendance Award in recognition of their attendance at every scheduled Council meeting during Program Year 2025-26 to Vice-Mayor Patricia Bouie Hutchinson; City of Hawthorne; Mayor Frank Davis, City of Live Oak; County Commissioner Thomas Demps, Taylor County; Mayor Jhelecia Hawkins, City of Jasper; County Commissioner James Howell, Hamilton County; and Vice-Mayor Janice Mortimer, City of Starke.

E. Executive Director's Cup

Mr. Koons stated that in furtherance of the Council Member Attendance Recognition Program and to encourage attendance at Council meetings, an Executive Director's Cup is awarded each year to recognize the most members with 100 percent attendance by either county, city or gubernatorial members during a program year.

Mr. Koons presented the 2025-26 Executive Director's Cup to City members Vice-Mayor Patricia Bouie Hutchinson, City of Hawthorne; Mayor Frank Davis, City of Live Oak; Mayor Jhelecia Hawkins, City of Jasper; and Vice-Mayor Janice Mortimer, City of Starke. He also stated that the Executive Director's Cup is prominently displayed at the Council office.

XII. COUNCIL MEMBER ANNOUNCEMENTS

Mayor Moore reported that the City of Madison will hold a swearing in ceremony for the new City of Madison Police Chief on July 28, 2026 at 5:30 p.m. at the Madison Woman's Club.

XIII. NEXT MEETING

Chair Hawkins stated that the next Council meeting is scheduled to be held on August 27, 2026.

SUBJECT: Local Government Comprehensive Planning Assistance Services Agreements -
Fiscal Year 2026-27

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the Chair to execute technical assistance services agreements on a fixed fee basis to assist counties and cities with implementing their comprehensive plans and land development regulations for Fiscal Year 2026-27.

BACKGROUND:

Each year the Council enters into technical assistance services agreements to assist local governments with implementing their comprehensive plans and land development regulations. The scope of services are, as follows.

- I. General Technical Assistance - conducting research, answering questions and assisting with comprehensive plan and land development regulations interpretations.
- II. Amendment Assistance - all Level I services, plus preparing public notices, draft ordinance, data and analysis and concurrency review for comprehensive plan text and map and land development regulations text and zoning map amendments.

The majority of these operations involve motor vehicle maintenance. On-site visits are required to collect information that is entered into an on-line database.

During these site visits, Council staff will provide recommendations on correcting problems with management techniques. A one-page summary of how to avoid the most common mistakes will also be provided to the facility operators.

The National Infrastructure Bank would perform as a traditional commercial bank and be able to provide financing in the form of loans to states, cities, counties, authorities and multi-state entities to address the infrastructure crisis in the nation. It is estimated that the National Infrastructure Bank would create an estimated 25 million new high paying jobs, increase the tax base and increase the productivity of the entire economy.

Legislation, H.R. 5356, has been introduced in Congress to establish the National Infrastructure Bank to assist in addressing the infrastructure needs of the nation. It is recommended that the Council adopt the attached resolution requesting the United States Congress to pass legislation to create a National Infrastructure Bank.

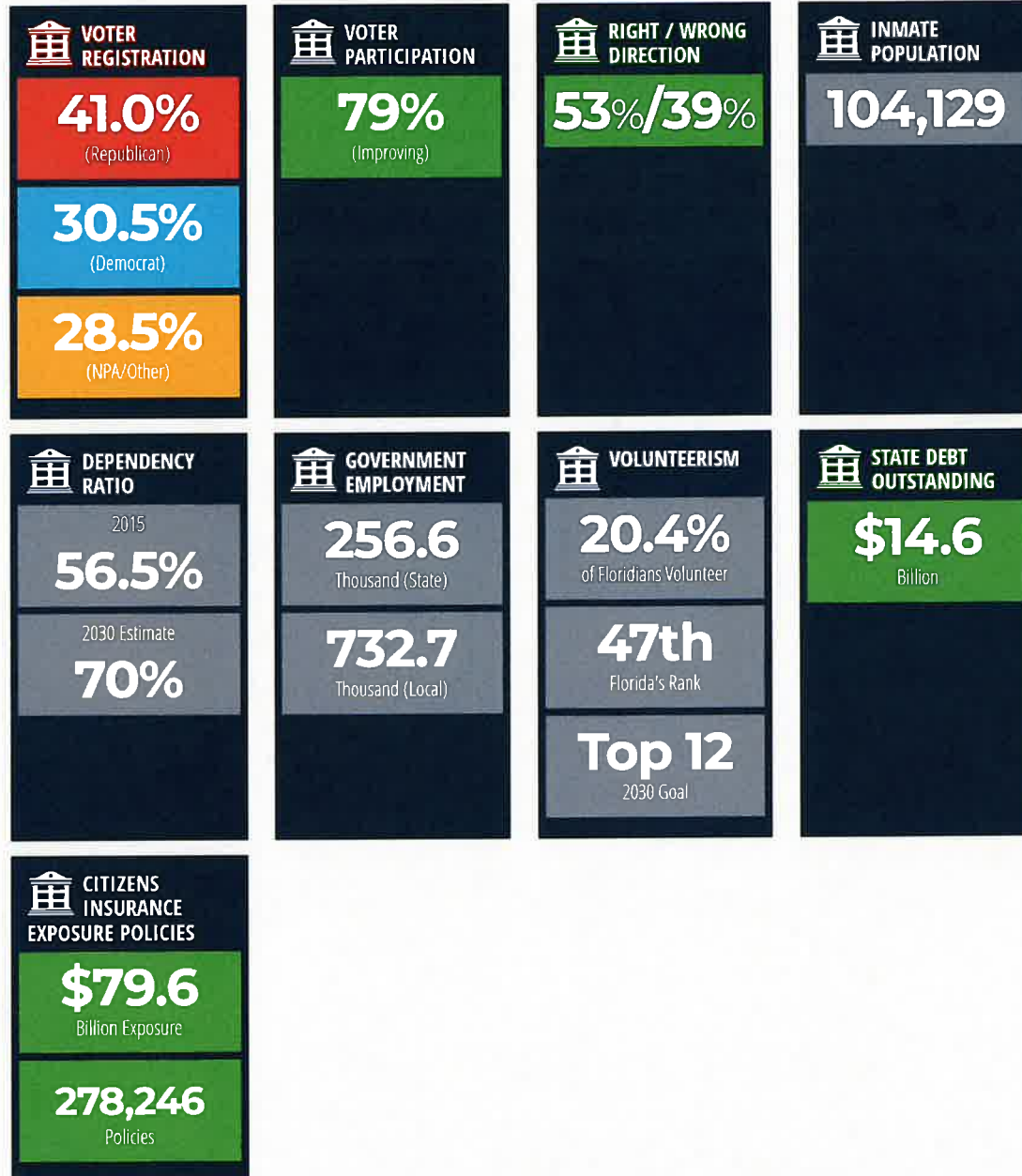
